The award, presented in Paris (France) in the majestic Grand Gallery of the National Museum of Natural History, was given to Robert Barbault for his book "Un Éléphant dans un jeu de quilles" [An Elephant in a Game of Skittles], which looks at man's place in biodiversity.

Changing our Behavior


